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## **Spring Pet Safety Tips**

As the weather gets warmer, the days get longer, and the flowers start to bloom, it's easy to forget the spring season can also be filled with hazards for our pets. Keep reading to learn more.

**Pesky Critters:** Warmer weather brings insects out of their hiding places. Some creepy crawlies are completely harmless to your pet while others could pose a risk. Insect bites or stings can cause allergic reactions involving facial swelling, trouble breathing, or anaphylactic shock. Ticks carry Lyme disease which can cause lethargy, lameness, and lead to more serious effects if not treated. Fleas are a nuisance year-round. The best way to avoid fleas and ticks is to use an effective flea and tick preventative.

**Spring Cleaning:** No time is better than springtime for a complete house-cleaning, but make sure all chemicals and cleaning products are kept out of your pet's reach. Be careful to read labels, even on all-natural products, before using any chemicals that could harm your pet.

**Update ID Tags:** Warm, pleasant warm weather means your pet will be spending more time outside which also brings more opportunities for your pet to wander away. Make sure all of the contact information on his ID tag is upto-date. *(continued on page 2)*

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If your pet has a microchip, check that all information registered with the microchip company is correct.


Guard your Garden: Be careful of the fertilizer, pesticide, and plants in your garden. Fertilizers, insecticides, and herbicides can all contain ingredients that could be dangerous to your pet if ingested. Always store these products out of your pet's reach and make sure to follow all instructions carefully. Certain plants can also pose a risk to your pet. Lilies are very toxic to cats if ingested and can lead to kidney failure without treatment. Flowers like rhododendron and azaleas are also toxic to pets if ingested. Visit aspca.org for a complete list of toxic plants.

Buckle Up: When traveling with your pet, make sure he is secured in either a crate or by a seatbelt harness designed for pets. Driving with a pet in the bed of a truck is very dangerous as is allowing a pet to stick his head out of a moving car's window. Any number of accidents can occur: abrupt stops or turns can cause major injury and flying debris or insects can cause inner ear or eye injuries.

With these simple tips in mind, your pet's spring is sure to be the perfect warm antidote to the cold, dark winter and the perfect lead up to a sunny summer.
